

OHNY'S DAY FOR THE DOGS


Each year over 4.5 million people in the United States are bitten by dogs and most of them are kids!

Johnny walks quietly up to the dog to pet it but then remembers what he was taught about dog bite prevention:

Never Surprise or Disturb a

Dog, Especially If It Is Eating or
Sleeping. You Could Startle The

Dog and It May Bite You.

Johnny stops before he gets any closer and then backs up without waking up the dog.



Johnny keeps strolling down the sidewalk and walks next to a fence where a dog is watching Johnny from behind the fence.

Johnny stops and begins to reach over the fence to pet the dog but then remembers what he was taught about dog bite prevention:

Never Reach Through or Over a Fence to Pet a Dog. Dogs Are Protective of Their Territory and May Bite You.


Johnny pulls his hand back before reaching over the fence and continues walking.



As Johnny turns a corner he notices
that a dog is running right at him.

Johnny begins to panic and he is about to start
running the other way when he remembers
what he was taught about dog bite prevention:

Do Not Run Away from a Dog. It May Chase
You and Bite You. Instead, Stop, Stay Calm
and Keep Your Arms and Hands Close to Your
Body. Try to Avoid Direct Eye Contact with the
Dog and Be Quiet. Do Not Yell or Scream. Let
the Dog Sniff You and Check You Out. Once the
Dog Determines You Are Not a Threat, It Will
Probably Just Go Away.



Johnny finally arrives at Jacob's house where Jacob's sister Molly is outside playing with her dog Buster.

Johnny notices that Buster looks angry. The dog's ears are flat against its head and its body becomes stiff. Johnny stops walking and Molly says, "It's OK Johnny Buster won't hurt you."

But Johnny remembers what he was taught about dog bite prevention:

Watch a Dog's Body Language.

If The Dog's Ears Go Flat, It Becomes Stiff and
It Looks Like It Is Getting Ready to Attack,

Do Not Approach The Dog!

"You only live three blocks away."

Johnny shrugged his shoulders and said, "Sorry Jacob it's a long story!"



"What do you want to do first Jacob?"

asked Johnny.
